


daughters. Together with his mother and father Harry and Susan Beasley, all former slaves on the Strickler and Gains/Moore farms, lived in the

Otis Moore log home. In 1871, fire consumed the house. With the help of neighbors a new home was built on the site that winter. In 1873 Daniel and Cindy Beasley purchased the home and several acres from the Otis Moore family. It has since fallen in, down the road from Longs Chapel. There was an old one room log building used for a school in Arkton built by the Quakers for a church in 1738. Sometime after 1772 it was moved to the toll gate farm where it was used as a church and also as a school. The Martz family living at the toll gate farm gave the log building to Daniel Beasley, who dismantled it and moved it to Arkton by wagon, where it was

set up again. It was known as "Beasley Colored

Lucinda" Beasley. They had four sons and three
